About Harp Seattle

Harp Seattle is a three-day festival at Dusty Strings Music Store & School in Seattle, WA for harpers of all levels to participate in an event that has been part of the folk harp community for over a decade. Seasoned performers present workshops created to enhance the skills and knowledge of players at all levels so there's something for everyone.

All workshops, concerts, and happenings take place at Dusty Strings Music Store & School, 3406 Fremont Avenue N, Seattle, except for the tour of the manufacturing facility, which is located at 3450 16th Avenue W in the Interbay neighborhood. Registration

Registration includes an all-access pass to the weekend's workshops, concerts, and happenings. Cost before June 15th: \$295. Cost after June 15th: \$345. Register online, by phone, or in-store. Harp rentals and extra concert tickets available. Registration does not include room and board.

Most workshops are hands-on experiences. Bring your harp to the workshops unless otherwise specified. (Harp storage is available all weekend at Dusty Strings.) We also recommend a tuner and recording device. October in Seattle can be warm and sunny or cold and rainy. Bring a raincoat and wear layers!

Presenters

Margaret Betts

Margaret (Shelton) Betts is a professional harpist in the Pacific Northwest. A native of Tacoma, WA, playing the harp has been her passion and joy since the age of six. A graduate of the University of Puget Sound summa cum laude in harp performance, Betts has performed extensively with orchestral, choral, and chamber ensembles, including as the principal harpist of the Olympia Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to performing, Betts served as Chairman of Membership for the World Harp Congress and treasurer for the American Harp Society Greater Seattle Chapter. Betts is delighted to bring a world of experiences to Harp Seattle 2018.

Aryeh Frankfurter

For more than twenty years, touring musician, record producer, and recording artist Aryeh Frankfurter has delighted audiences around the globe with passionate, enduring, and evocative music. His uncommon approach to folk harp music —and command of the Swedish nyckelharpa—have earned him accolades from The International Folk Harp Journal, Alternate Music Press, The San Francisco Chronicle, and Classical Guitar Magazine. He's performed for Prince Charles and Lady Camilla Bowles Parker, for an audience of thousands at Dalhalla Amphitheatre in Rattvik, Sweden, at Sweden's Musik Vid Siljan, as well as festivals, fairs, conferences, and music camps as both a performer and teaching artist. His music is syndicated on Public Radio International (PRI) and he's shared the stage with Patrick Ball, Lisa Lynne, Barbara Higbie, and Liz Story. "A gem among the San Francisco musician scene," writes the Bay Area Folk Harp Society Journal.

Martha Gallagher

Singer-songwriter Martha Gallagher defies expectation with her instrument of choice, the folk harp. "My vision of the Celtic harp is expansive," she says. "This incredibly versatile instrument gives voice to the wonderfully diverse music that sings through the heart of my very being." Gallagher seeks to "acknowledge and honor the harp's rich history, while at the same time exploring its ability to speak with a contemporary musical voice."

Gallagher has shared this vision through performances and original works for over thirty years, including tours

throughout the U.S. and Canada, appearances on BBC Television and Good Morning Arizona, sharing the stage with six-time GRAMMY® winners The Chieftains, and teaching and performing at the American Harp Society National Conference, Somerset Harp Festival, Berklee College of Music, and Boston Conservatory. To date, Gallagher has produced seven albums of original compositions on her own indie label, Singing Strings.

In 2011, while touring Dusty Strings' manufacturing facility with co-owners Ray and Sue Mooers, Gallagher noticed a stack of abandoned wood pieces in the comer. Ray referred to them as "the orphans": pieces of tonewood that did not have the requisite matching pieces to make a harp. Gallagher envisioned an "orphan harp" built out of a variety of tonewoods and, after some persuading, Ray and the team set out designing and building it out of pieces of maple, bubinga, and black walnut. The story of the first Orphan Harp inspired Gallagher's piece, "The Orphan's Odyssey," which premiered at Lake Placid Sinfonietta. Gallagher continues to perform on the harp (who she named Hope), as well as arranging and performing her original works with symphonies and ensembles.

Lisa Lynne

Multi-instrumentalist Lisa Lynne gained world-wide recognition for her original music featuring Celtic harp after making television appearances on NBC, CNN, Fox News Atlanta, and the award-winning PBS special, Alone in the Wilderness. Lynne's unique approach to life and business, as well as her groundbreaking work in therapeutic music programs, earned her the attention of The Wall Street Journal and in 2011 Los Angeles Magazine chose her as one of L.A.'s fifty most inspiring women. A Windham Hill recording artist, she also owns her own production company and recording studio, Lavender Sky Music.

Lynne's passion for music therapy led her to start the program Hands-on-Harps to place musicians in hospitals, and she became the first musician-in-residence at City of Hope National Cancer Center in Los Angeles.

Lynne's recordings have surpassed a million in sales, placed in the Top 20 Billboard Charts (her album Hopes and Dreams reached #6), and she holds top spots in the Celtic, New Age, and World Music radio airplay charts. Her new book, How to Succeed with Self-Produced Concerts,

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is on sale now through her website and will be available for purchase at Harp Seattle.

Catherine Madden

Catherine Madden is Principal Lecturer for the University of Washington's Professional Actor Training Program, Director of the Alexander Technique Training and Performance Studio in Seattle, and Associate Director and Research Director for Body Chance in Japan. She is a regular guest teacher for Alexander Technique training schools and arts organizations in Australia, England, Germany, Japan, Scotland, Switzerland, and the U.S.

For nearly twenty years, Madden studied the Alexander Technique with Marjorie Barstow who was the first to graduate from F.M. Alexander's first training course. Madden's well-known abilities to observe and analyze movement in relationship to artistic performance has made her a popular coach in Seattle and internationally for musicians, dancers, actors, speakers, teachers, and private students.

A founding member of Alexander Technique International (ATI), Madden recently published Integrative Alexander Technique Practice for Performing Artists: Onstage Synergy (University of Chicago Press) and is currently at work on a second book about teaching the Alexander Technique.

Susan McLain

McLain (known to many as Tudy), is the founder of Greensleeves Harp Music, providing professional harp music to the Pacific Northwest for over twenty-five years. A past principal harpist with the Seattle Philharmonic, McLain has performed and recorded Celtic and concert harp music with Beth Kollé,

Michael MacBean, and Laurie Riley. She's taught at the International Folk Harp Conference and Vashon Island Harp Camp, and has performed at more than 2,000 weddings.

While serving as President of Seattle Musicians Association Local 76-493, McLain was appointed by Governor Gary Locke to serve on the Washington State Arts Commission and Strategic Plan for the Arts, where she championed improved working conditions for folk musicians. In addition to harp, McLain also teaches private flute and pennywhistle lessons and leads the Irish Music Ensemble at Dusty Strings Music School.

Ray Mooers

Dusty Strings co-founder Ray Mooers was already an accomplished hammered dulcimer builder and player when he became fascinated with the lever harp and took a beginning harp class. He began collecting information on harp design and construction, and started experimenting with building lever harps in 1984. Using the "perfectionist" joinery that had established Dusty Strings' reputation, the company's first production harp, the FH26, had an innovative solid mahogany soundboard and was warmly received by retailers and customers. The company has since put over 16,000 harps into people's hands all over the world.

Alfredo Roland Ortiz

Internationally acclaimed composer, author, educator, recording artist and soloist Dr. Alfredo Rolando Ortiz has recorded over forty albums and is the winner of a Gold Record in South America.

Bom in Cuba, Ortiz immigrated with his family to Venezuela when he was eleven years old. Four years later, he began studying the Venezuelan folk harp with a school friend and soon after, the Paraguayan folk harp under Alberto Romero. During his first year in medical school in Medellín, Colombia, he began performing professionally and recorded his first album. Music supported his studies until graduation in 1970.

In 1975, Ortiz moved to the United States where he continued working in the medical field as well as a harpist and recording artist until 1978 when his wife, Luz Marina, became pregnant. In order to have time for his growing family, he decided to commit himself full-time to both his family and the harp. Since then, he's performed at the World Harp Congress, International Folk Harp Conference, Edinburgh International Harp Festival, Somerset Folk Harp Festival, and the American Harp Society Conference.

With a multicultural repertoire that covers folk, classical, and popular music from many countries, as well as his original compositions, Ortiz has performed all over North and South America and Europe, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Turkey, and the Czech Republic. Throughout it all, however, he considers his most important concerts to be playing in the delivery room during the births of his second daughter and two younger grandsons.

Monica Schley

Monica Schley is a harpist, poet, mother, songwriter, wedding musician, teacher, bandleader, and touring artist. She eamed her B.A. from the Uni-

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versity of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, where she studied English and music, and took rigorous harp lessons with Frances Miller, principal harpist of the Minnesota Orchestra. She's also taken master classes with harpists Ruttiger Opperman, Park Stickney, Laurie Riley, and Lori Andrews.

As a performer, Schley has worked with established local and national composers Jherek Bischoff, Samantha Boshnack, Butch Morris, Evan Flory-Barnes, Ahamefule J. Oluo, Jim Knapp, Eyvand Kang, Christina Vantzou, rap artist Kanye West, and with the bands Secret Chiefs 3 and Hey Marsailles. Orchestrally, she has played with Puget Sound Symphony Orchestra, Seattle Rock Orchestra, and Degenerate Art Orchestra.

A Certified Clinical Musician, Schley works with Providence Hospice as a therapeutic harpist.

Some of her writing can be found in literary journals, at pyragraph.com, *Harp Therapy Journal*, and King County Metro's *Poetry on Buses*. She lives in Seattle with her husband, designer/illustrator Stephen Schildbach, and their two children.

It's easy to think of what you can't do as opposed to exploring what you already know. Discover how less can be more as you create your own beautiful arrangements. Challenge your imagination by learning a slow, simple tune that will help you identify potential stumbling blocks, then apply simple tricks, tools, and techniques for overcoming them. These principles apply to both small and full-size harps on which you might want to do more but feel limited by their size. For beginners or anyone with a small harp (22-27 strings or lap harp).

Creating Music for Therapeutic Settings

Learn chords and progressions you can use in therapeutic settings and how to choose appropriate music for any situation. Practice improvising in any key and get tips for playing music in medical settings. Share ideas and experiences and look at the current climate of music in hospitals and hospices. Injury Prevention

All That Jazz

Marvebus music from the 1930s, '40s and '50s comes alive in this workshop where no jazz harp experience is necessary. Discover the sounds and pieces characteristic of the era and the techniques and tricks to play them. Achieve with ease and panache new chord possibilities for songs heard in many wonderful, old movies. For intermediate to advanced level players.

Latin & South American Rhythms

Explore the unique rhythms, poly-rhythms, and syncopations from several countries, including habanera, conga, cumbia, tango, zamba, joropo, polca paraguaya, and cha-cha-cha. Latin American Harp Techniques

Recording Your Music

The Alexander Technique for Harpists

Students may take either or both of the workshops as the content is not sequential.

From I-5, take Exit 169 for NE 45th Street and turn left to head west on NE 45th Street. Turn left on Stone Way Avenue N, drive to N 34th Street, and turn right. Drive until you reach Fremont Avenue N, then turn right. Dusty Strings is near the corner of N 34th Street and Fremont Avenue N next to Chase Bank.

Parking

By Bus

You can also take Seattle's bus system, King County Metro. From downtown Seattle, take either the 40 or the 62 bus. There's a convenient bus stop at the entrance to Dusty Strings. For bus routes, visit kingcounty.gov.

From I-5, take Exit 169 for NE 45^{th} Street and turn left to head west on NE 45^{th} Street. Bear right onto N Midvale Place and continue onto N 46^{th} Street. Stay on N 46^{th} Street until it becomes NW Market Street. Keep left and continue on NW Market Street. Turn left to head south onto 15^{th} Avenue W and across the Ballard Bridge. Bear right onto W Bertona Street then right onto 16^{th} Avenue W. It is a big green building on your right.

From the music store to the tour head south across the Fremont Bridge and turn right onto Nickerson Street, which becomes W Nickerson Street. Stay to the right and follow the signs to City Center and 15th Avenue W. This will put you on 15th Avenue W shortly before the W Bertona Street exit (see above).

From the tour back to the music store head south on 16th Avenue W and turn left onto W Dravus Street, then a quick left onto 15th Avenue W. Take the first exit toward Nickerson Street. Turn left (north) on Fremont Avenue N across the bridge and across 34th Street and Dusty Strings is the second business on the right.
